I want to be sure to thank all those on the Club committees who are busily helping us get ready for the spring fundraisers! The Rodeo Parade, the Buckaroo Breakfast and the Antique and Collectibles Sale will need a lot of help in the next month; so be sure to raise your hand and volunteer when the time comes.!! And don't forget that our first Black Butte Run will take place quicker than we can imagine in September; it could turn into a big event, and we need to be sure that it is a great success the first year.

Since we did not have time this month for a full President's meeting, I thought I should share a little more information about the April Board meeting. As usual, there are numerous activities taking place.

For the last several months, the Board has been discussing new Youth protection issues and how we can form policies and guidelines to address these issues. We are trying to structure policies in such a way that they provide appropriate protection for children and are manageable administratively. A key focus is on how we will administer and monitor background checks.

The Board approved the purchase of a new PA system for about \$300. Hopefully those of us with hearing aids will now be able to easily hear what is taking place. **Dan Stearns** will let the Sisters Little League know that our gift to them is for maintaining and displaying the Sisters Kiwanis sign at the ballpark.

Under new business the Board decided to test out the use of a new web system, called MEETUP, for up to 6 months. **Dave Huni** will soon be giving us a tutorial on how to use the system. The objective is to allow club members to communicate more easily on project sign ups or other gatherings. This beta test will cost about \$10.00/month. **Tom Worcester** discussed a Preemptive member retention program he and the membership committee developed. It will be added to the club Policies and Procedures. The Board approved paying \$40 for Boy Scout Troop 139's national registration and also approved **Linda Walker** as the club's delegate at the KI annual convention this June.

At the beginning of the year the Board approved setting ten goals for Board analysis over the next year. I am pleased that we have completed work on five of these goals and actively working on the others. You will hear more about this as the summer unfolds.


