Club to Try MeetUp App to Let Members Know of Volunteer Opportunities By:Dave Huni

Wouldn't it be great if you had a couple hours of time on your hands and poof, your smartphone or computer let you know you could help at the Food Bank and how many folks were going to show up...so you knew you were really needed. Or, you were off enjoying a trip to some tropical location and knew you wanted to cook eggs at the Buckaroo Breakfast but couldn't remember who to contact for details when you got back? Now with *MeetUp*, an App (free on iOS, Android and PC/Mac) that helps people find others who share their interest or cause that regularly meet face-to-face, we may be able to help you work on Club Projects you were not even aware were ongoing or needed you.



Early in the year, the Board set a goal of seeing how we could improve our ability to sign up for projects and enhance communication within the club. We also wanted a way to communicate with members who miss the Thursday meeting or had to leave early before announcements. **Dave Huni** and **Dave Cox** evaluated several options. One way was to develop our own "system". However we learned this would be beyond our modest technical abilities and other options were readily available through Facebook, Google, and SimplyCircle.

After weeding through the pros and cons of each, they recommended Meetup because it:

- seems "easy" to use and set up
- will work in both PC and iOS/Android mobile applications
- might appeal to younger members who work
- allows us to keep communication confined to just club members or accessible by the general public
- may provide more exposure of club activities to the public
- may serve as an alternative to our website in the future

Of course any system is only as good as its simplicity and usefulness. As of now, only 6 or 7 Kiwanians have signed up and that's good. Thank these folks as the guinea pigs...I mean early adopters of the Club. They are providing **Dave Huni** feedback on the quantity of notifications and their timeliness/usefulness. **Dave** will be giving us a tutorial at a future President's Meeting and help folks sign-up as they need it.

The Club has purchased a six month trial membership in MeetUp which comes to about \$10/month. This covers the use of their App and allows us to have MeetUp Organizers which put the info into the App on the projects/meetings. The nice feature is that everyone in our Sisters Kiwanis MeetUp can see who is going to what, we can define our needs for each event, and even take in money if there is a cost that needs to be shared.

We envision having several key Organizers that will fill in the info on the App. For example, the Food Bank could have MeetUps for each shift on Wednesdays and Thursdays; the Membership Committee could have a MeetUp for its Fireside chats for new members; or the Fundraising Committee could use the App to take signups for shift to sell Quilt Raffle tickets.

As with all new things, there are details to be worked through, but we hope you'll give this a try. We really believe this App can help us keep those busy folks who can't make a meeting in the loop so they can participate when they are able.
