Kiwanis Awards Career Grant

Kiwanis awards career grant

Diedre Jones of Sisters was recently awarded a Kiwanis Career Opportunity Fund (COF) grant to pay for training as a medical radiology technician.

Sisters Kiwanis awards grants to Sisters-area adults who are seeking a career change. The COF assists adults (25 or older) who are financially unable to return to school or retrain for a career change.

Since its inception, the fund has awarded more than \$55,000 in assistance to help Sisters-area residents reach their educational dreams.

Jones will enroll at Linn-Benton Community College to learn her new profession. Linn-Benton offers a distance education program in diagnostic imaging that will enable Diedre to remain in Sisters while she completes the 22-month program. She will take classes online through FaceTime and do the clinical work at local medical imaging labs.

Diedre says that her goal is to work in the medical field that will provide her a life-long stable profession with a higher income than she currently makes. She also emphasized that without the financial support from Kiwanis it would be quite

difficult to get started in the program.

The COF provides assistance to start, augment or complete a career that may include vocational, technical, artistic or general fields of study. Funds are available to qualified residents within the Sisters area regardless of age, gender, disability, marital status, race or current occupation. Kiwanis does not set limitations on potential use of the award.

"Yoshinori (Yoshi) Furuya

(from the beginning of my existence)

1. Birth date: December 27, 1946

I was born 1 year and 4 months after the very end of the second world war. Baby boomers begin at Japan a year after my birth. Because I remember explosion of number of classes at elementary schools just after my grade.

2. Place of Birth: Itami-city, Hyogo-prefecture, Japan

Itami is located northwest of Osaka. There was a US air-force base at Itami. And it was the sole air field at that time around Osaka, Kyoto, and Kobe. So, I grew up seeing US occupation on daily bases.

3. Religion

My family's religion is traditionally Buddhism so, I grew up chanting Buddhism prayer with family at home. Eventually, a curiosity started growing up about Christianity in my mind at the age of my high school period and I start reading books. Concluded contacting Catholic church and then Baptism. Before Baptism, the church asked me to discuss about it with the family. For my mother, it's like a thunderclap but, she was more comprehensive about faith as a very personal matter.

4. Education

My last schooling was at Sophia University, Tokyo. I was a bit older than average of other students since I had to deviate schooling, start working because of economic situation. After college, I went to Nova Scotia, Canada, at a Jesuit university, there was a short course about social development through cooperative. It was 1976. And she was there, too. Who?? Oh, Cecilia, my wife taking same course. So, we met there.

5. Marriage

We got married in Itami, Japan, January 4, 1978. Cecilia went there since I had asked her to do so. I couldn't imagine Cecilia, a south American, living in Japan where her newly married husband absent from home till 9 to 10 PM, every day. So, I told her after marriage we would move to Ecuador so she would be living very near to her family. So, she went to Japan and we got married there so my family could see her, know and like her.

6. Living in Ecuador

After about a month of our marriage, we moved to Ecuador. We started our living at Cuenca, where Cecilia's parents and all of her 5 siblings living there. About first 3 years, our living was very hard, especially for me since I had to learn Spanish at first. I had struggled to obtain enough money to sustain family living, it's my obligation. Our first daughter had born December 1978, 3 years later, our second daughter. And 2 years later, our son. We got totally 3 kids in our marriage. After about 3 years of my struggling, Japanese consulate called me saying a Japanese trading company is looking for a Japanese to work for them. For working for them, we had to move to Guayaguil, Ecuadorian's seaport town. As we had already struggled 3 years, we accepted it and moved to Guayaguil. At first just me, because our second daughter was about to arrive to our lives. About 3 months after the second daughter's birth, my family moved to Guayaguil to live with me. We lived there about 7 years. After that we decided to work as an independent agent bases. As the company started exigent to me to work as in Japan, I didn't want keep working for them living in Ecuador. If I was to work as other Japanese do living in Japan, I wouldn't move to Ecuador at first hand. So, we moved to Cuenca again, in 1989, and started working as an independent agent. As I looked for to amplify my line of products, a Japanese rubber industry, car tires, accepting my offer to work for them. Two years later, a Taiwanese tire company, too. Our business as independent agent starting to solidify. Around 1993, we started receiving high school exchange students from Montana to our home. There was a private volunteer based, yearly exchange program between Cuenca and Bozeman. It's the beginning of relationship between my family and Montana. Once, a high school teacher at Three Forks, west of Bozeman, joined students from Bozeman and stayed at our home. A week later, her husband Dr. Harry Frits joined group and stayed at our home with his wife. He was a chairman of dept. of history at University of Montana, Missoula at that time. It was 1996 and that year our oldest daughter was graduation from high school. Dr. Frits invited my daughter to study at the University of Montana. As a young girl, she obviously wanted to go there. I said to her, go there and if you liked, you can keep studying there, if not you can come back. She had not decided yet what major to take for study at that time and I said her she can take economics as she is so good at mathematics and with economics she can learn about human nature. And a year later she can decide what major she take. She followed my suggestion and liked it very much. So, she kept economics as her major. After graduating at Missoula, she went to John Hopkins to study international economics for master degree. Nothing of those had been in my planning for our children's education. Our family finance started bleedings.



Three years later our second daughter just imagined, she also was going there for college. How we could say no to her, if oldest went there. It's simply not fair for her. Two year later, our son, he was to Bozeman. After graduating at Missoula, our oldest daughter got married to a guy from Nebraska. Our second daughter, after graduating, she worked as for internship at Alabama, then at Lake Tahoe area and then got married to a guy from Iowa. Our son, the last one, the company he worked as for internship, wanted him to keep working for them and applied working visa for him. He also got married later but to an Ecuadorian girl. He actually went there for two years to get a girl who wants to marry him. All three of our kids were going to stay here in U.S., so our kids proposed us to move to U.S. We were not so old, but not for so long. And for our grandchildren, it supposed to be some of them, Especially Cecilia would like to be here to be near to them. First of our grandkid came to this world in 2006. Now we got totally six grandkids. So, we agreed to them and applied for resident visa. We just simply imagined it would take about 10 years for visa process. But we were wrong, it came in three years. So, I was forced to retire to move here in December 2008. In September 2008, there was also Lehman Brothers financial scandal. It was too much for us, too. It's for us now ninth year living here. In 2011, Bob Walters sponsored me and got inducted to Kiwanis. It's my sixth year now."
